

Progress Report – Year 1 – 5 December 2009

This progress report summarizes the Center on Aging's (CoA) accomplishments from December 1, 2005 when it began operating as an independent, free-standing center to the present. The progress related to the CoA's primary objective – to enhance the visibility and support for aging-related research at the University of Utah – will be summarized with respect to three specific aims that were subsequently formulated for the K07 Geriatric Academic Leadership Award – an NIA infrastructure grant funded in 2007 (Mark Supiano, PI) to support the CoA's strategic goals.

Specific Aim 1. Expand the number of investigators with aging-related research interests.

There has been substantial growth within the Utah Center on Aging (CoA) program in the following metrics: its faculty membership (inclusive of new faculty recruitment) and aging-related grant funding – both in number of funded investigators and direct cost funding levels.

• <u>Members</u>:

There are now approximately 100 University of Utah CoA faculty members – there were five in October 2005. These faculty represent ten schools and colleges from across the entire University campus – about two-thirds are from Health Sciences and one-third from main campus colleges.

• Faculty recruitment and development:

Represented in the growth in CoA membership are 25 new faculty members – both external recruitments as well as internal growth resulting from faculty development. University of Utah CoA Faculty Members Recruited Since 2005



<u>Aging-related grant funding</u>:

As of December 2009, aging-related research grant funding and the number of funded investigators have grown to \$13.9 million and 40 funded faculty investigators. Illustrated in the figure below, this represents a more than three-fold increase in annual direct cost funding and a similar three-fold increase in the number of funded investigators. Detailed information concerning these grants is provided in Appendix A.



Several of these grants that have provided critical programmatic support are listed below.

• D.W. Reynolds Foundation.

The University of Utah School of Medicine was been awarded a four year \$2 million grant in 2006 (M. Supiano, PI) to help address one of the most urgent needs in U.S. health care: competent medical treatment for the nation's growing elderly population. The grant—"Comprehensive Program to Strengthen Physicians' Training in Geriatrics"— is funded by the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation.

• Utah Governor's Commission on Aging

In 2005, the legislature created the Commission within the Governor's office to address how state government and the private sector can prepare for the wave of aging individuals that began in 2006 when the oldest baby boomers turn 60. Its initial two year appropriation was renewed for second two year term when the Commission moved to the University of Utah to join the CoA. As of October 2009 the Commission on Aging entered into a cooperative agreement with the Administration on Aging (AoA) to make it easier for people in Utah to learn about and access the full array of long-term care options that are available in their communities. This award provides three years of support for the Commission's ongoing activities.

• John A. Hartford Geriatric Nursing Center of Excellence

The University of Utah was awarded a Hartford Center for Geriatric Nursing Excellence in 2007. It is designed to increase the number of faculty qualified to teach geriatric nursing through national and regional strategies. This five-year, \$1 million dollar award will be augmented with significant investment in geriatric education by the University of Utah. Along with funding support comes the prestige of being affiliated with this nationally-recognized leader in the advancement of geriatric care and education.

• VA Programmatic Growth

The support the CoA program receives from the VA for aging-related research and centers is substantial and has grown dramatically in the last several years. The VA Salt Lake City Geriatric Research, Education and Clinical Center (GRECC; \$1.6 M annual budget) was successfully reviewed and its program renewed in March 2009 by the VA's Geriatrics and Gerontology Advisory Committee. It is important to note new funding of three major VA centers based at the Salt Lake City VA that are closely connected with the GRECC and its aging-research mission. These centers are not listed in the above total of aging specific grants. Two of the centers are led by GRECC faculty – Drs. Bair and Nebeker. Together, these VA centers awarded in the past year have combined annual funding in excess of \$7 million.

- The VA Western Region Rural Health Resource Center directed by Byron Bair, MD focuses on health care access and technology; the targeted populations are Native American and Geriatric. (\$2.0 M annual budget)
- A HSR&D Research Enhancement Award Program, the Informatics, Decision Enhancement, And Surveillance (IDEAS) Center led by Matt Samore, MD (\$250K annual budget)
- Veterans' Informatics, iNformation, and Computing Infrastructure (VINCI) led by Jonathan Nebeker, MD. (\$5M annual budget)

In summary, continued substantial progress is being made in the measurable goals for this aim – the increase in CoA membership, aging research grants, the number of investigators with funded programs in aging-related research, and programmatic growth through recruitment and by career development.

Specific Aim 2. Foster the development of new interdisciplinary collaborations in aging research.

The Center's visibility also continues to grow through the following activities.

- <u>Communications</u>:
 - Center's web presence (<u>www.aging.utah.edu</u>)
 - Facebook presence launched November 2009
 - monthly e-newsletter (with past issues archived on the web site)
 - University of Utah-wide web-based events calendar link
- Pilot grant program:
 - The CoA's pilot grant program has to date received 56 applications (representing 49 unique investigators due to resubmissions).
 - Of these, seventeen have been funded a 30% funding success rate.
 - A total of \$470K has been invested in this program.

Two pilot grant recipients have received new extramural grants in 2009 as a direct outcome of their pilot project funding: JoAnne LaFleur, PharmD. received a five-year career development award from AHRQ. Zac Zimmer, PhD will be awarded funding for an NIA R01 (Modeling Disability Trajectories in Rapidly Aging Populations; 2-year total cost budget: \$428,000).

<u>Research Retreat:</u>

The Center inaugurated its now annual research retreat in March 2007. Retreat activities include a welcome reception and poster session for CoA faculty and trainees the afternoon of the first day. The following day's morning session includes oral presentations from the currently funded pilot grant recipients and a keynote address from a prominent external gerontologist. An exciting new partnership was forged in 2009 with the Siciliano Foundation. The Foundation agreed to have the topic for the 2009 Siciliano Forum focus on aging. The October 2009 Siciliano Forum, "Global Aging in the 21st Century: Challenges, Opportunities and Implications for the US" was very well received. It is expected that a conference proceedings will be published as an outcome of the forum's presentations.

• <u>Research Infrastructure support</u>: The K07 award is also supporting the creation of an infrastructure to support aging-related research with a long range goal of

developing these components into cores that will support program project and/or center grant applications. The creation of an Aging Studies Subject Registry from the existing Utah Population Database (UPDB) has been initiated. A subset of individuals from the UPDB will be identified and invited to concurrently be listed in the Aging Studies Registry. Its creation was delayed in order to take advantage of the funding of the Utah Center for Clinical and Translational Science (CCTS) and to coordinate its development with similar CCTS initiatives.

In summary, substantial progress has been made toward accomplishing the second specific aim's goals. Future plans include a process to formally evaluate the success of the pilot grant program, and to develop the Aging Studies Subject Registry.

Specific Aim 3. Develop a multidisciplinary research training program in aging for preand post-doctoral trainees.

In parallel with the first two aims, progress has been made in expanding opportunities for research training for individuals from multiple disciplines and at several levels of training. Within the School of Medicine, a Student Chapter of the American Geriatrics Society was created and has been used to advertise the availability of summer research experiences for first year medical students through the NIA T35 Medical Student Training in Aging Research (MSTAR) program. Two students were funded in Summer 2008 – one through MSTAR and one internally and three students received MSTAR funding in Summer 2009.

The Geriatric Medicine fellowship program has graduated four fellows since 2006, with one fellow currently enrolled. In addition, we have been very successful in identifying and filling our allotted VA Special Fellowship in Advanced Geriatrics positions which provide two years of additional training beyond the clinical year to promote academic career development.

An important step was achieved in 2009 with the submission and legislative passage of an amendment to the Utah Workforce Financial Assistance Program that will make loan forgiveness available to qualified geriatric healthcare providers. Working in partnership with the Utah Commission on Aging the legislation proposing this mechanism was drafted and ultimately passed by the Utah legislature during its 2009 session. Based on the success of similar programs we are confident that this program will aid in our ability to recruit, train and retain geriatric healthcare providers in Utah.

Career development of junior faculty who have interests in aging research has also been successful. Several examples include the following career development awards: Brad Katz, MD, (Ophthalmology – Jahnigen Award); JoAnne LaFleur, PharmD (AHRQ); Brian Sauer, PhD (VA); Matthew Rondina, MD (K23); Walter Wray, PhD (Parker B. Francis and American Heart Association Awards).

In summary, substantial progress is being made to accomplish the goal to provide research training in aging for pre- and post-doctoral trainees. Successfully filling the clinical fellow positions will help the program continue to fill its advanced training positions. Junior faculty development in academic geriatric careers is also being supported.

Overall Summary of Progress and Future Directions

In summary, much progress has been made in the last four years in meeting the objective to enhance the visibility and support for aging-related research at the University of Utah. Institutional support from the Senior Vice Presidents' Offices supplemented by funding from NIH and the State legislature has been crucial to the CoA success to date. In turn, the growth in aging-related research grants, especially that emanating from the pilot grant program, provide evidence for the return on the investment that the institution has made to date.

A budget request to maintain the current funding level for the CoA's operational expenses and pilot grant program for FY2011 through FY2015 is being submitted. With ongoing support, continued growth in each of the three specific aims summarized in this progress report is expected. The next phase in the CoA's evolution is to mature around one or more of several emerging themes (e.g. exercise and mobility/ falls; vascular aging, neurocognitive aging, genetics of longevity) to develop multi-disciplinary training grants and research cores. These components will serve as the foundation to develop successful applications for program project and center grants – ultimately to support establishing a NIA-funded Older Americans Independence (Pepper) Center at the University of Utah.
